

Figure 1 Sensitivity Temperature Dependence




Figure 1 shows the variation in sensitivity caused by changes in temperature.

Figure 2 Zero Temperature Dependence





Figure 2 shows the variation in zero output caused by changes in temperature, expressed as ppm gas equivalent, referenced to zero at 20°C.
